Happy New Year Toastmasters!

Our second half of our Toastmasters year is off to a flying start with some exciting initiatives shared by Lark Doley our International President, which are shared below.

2019 is going to be an awesome year for you as a member and for our District, achieving our goals together. We commence the year with the first Corporate Leadership Forum. The purpose of the Corporate Leadership Forums is to expand our network and reach out to the corporate environment, raising awareness of Toastmasters and the many benefits of being a Toastmaster, and better still, starting a corporate club. These forums will give members an opportunity to present a workshop, give a speech, a pitch, or MC the event, and network with like-minded people.

Club Leader Training (COT) is underway, as is District Leader training as myself, Sue and Vicki are about to head off to Los Angeles for our mid year training. I have a load of pre-work to get completed, so that's all from me! I will leave with you Lark Doleys' email – *thanks for being awesome*.

Dear District Leaders,

2019 will be remembered as the year of the Wow and we want you to be ready!

Below are summaries of three important organizational initiatives, involving club quality, the club coach program and the district recognition program, which were shared at the first Mid-year Training in Dubai this week.

- **Club Quality:** The *Wow!Factor* Project: This new 2019 program is a chance for all Toastmasters to show off their wow! Immediately following a kickoff email from International President Lark Doley, club officers will start 2019 by doing a deep analysis of their club. Using tools to fully assess performance, they will find the gaps and areas of weakness. February will be the month when clubs start putting their analyses and vital findings into action, with the intent being 'the best club possible.' The goal is to get members to think and say "wow!" when they attend a meeting. Members will be invited to send in a one-minute video of their club's unique wow experience using #wowfactor. By March, the wow factor of clubs should be in full motion and kept in motion.

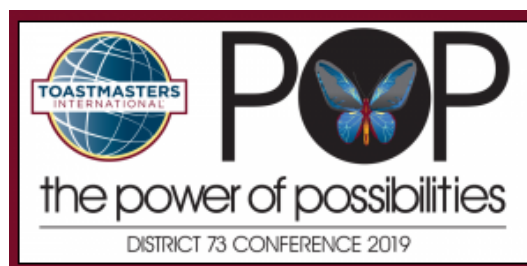
- **Club Coach Program Changes:** As you know, the club coach program provides critical support to clubs that are struggling and need long-term outside help to raise their membership and level of excellence. Successful club coaches traditionally receive credit toward the ALS or DTM award for their service as a coach. In addition, the ALS award also requires one year of service as a district officer. But starting now, successful club coaches will also be credited with service as a district officer. This means successful club coaches will complete two of the ALS/DTM requirements rather than one. Club coaches will still have two years to help clubs become distinguished—all of this year and through the 2019-2020 program year. You may have members in your district who doubted their ability to achieve the traditional DTM award by June 30, 2020—this revised club coach program facilitates this.

- **District Recognition Program Changes:** The Board of Directors understands the recent challenges with meeting District Recognition status and the desire to facilitate success; therefore, it decided to modify the Distinguished District Program for the 2018-2019 and 2019-2020 years to encourage district teams to focus on the mission and, at a minimum, reach Distinguished District status. For example, **Distinguished District** now requires 1.5% net membership payment growth, 1.5% net club growth, and 40% of the club base to be distinguished. **Select Distinguished District** now requires 3% net membership payment growth, 3% net club growth, and 45% of the club base to be distinguished. **President's Distinguished District** now requires 5% net membership payment growth, 5% net club growth, and 50% of the club base to be distinguished. **Smedley Distinguished District**, a new level, requires 8% net membership payment growth, 8% net club growth, and 55% of the club base to be distinguished.

We hope you're excited about these initiatives as we embark on a successful new year!

Club Leadership training (Club Officer training/Toastmasters Leadership Institute) Round 2, 1st December 2018 until 28th February 2019

Our Division Directors are busy organising the Club leadership training (COT/TLI). These training sessions are coordinated by the Division Directors for recognition in the Distinguished club program to fulfil their responsibility in their role. Materials can be [found here](#). A manual to assist the Division directors and others for support is also listed: [Training Club Leaders Manual](#). All training sessions will be advertised for registration [online here](#).

All locked in dates are on the District [calendar here](#). The second round of training must be held 1st December through to 28th February to qualify for the [Distinguished Club Program](#). Every role is supported with manuals and online tutorials through Toastmasters international but face to face training is necessary to aid members in a greater understanding through discussions and workshops. If you are interested in stepping into a leadership role at your club, feel free to come along to the training, you are most welcome.

Club presidents are responsible for encouraging their seven club executive team members to these sessions to enable a well-educated team to support their members. All seven executive positions would be filled where possible. However, a club must have a minimum of three officers: the president, a vice president and the secretary or secretary-treasurer, and each of these offices must be held by a different person. Further information for club officers [here](#), in the Club Leadership [Handbook](#) and [Form 6A Club Constitution](#) which share valuable information on all club executive officer roles. Division Directors will share the District alignment plan at their training.

The deadline for District Leadership elected positions have been extended from Saturday 15 December 2018 to **Saturday 23 February 2019.**

Note - All elected or appointed positions must be held by a member in good standing, of a Toastmasters club in good standing.

The 2019-2020 year will be the final opportunity to complete a District Officer Role for the Advanced Leadership Silver (ALS) Award under the Traditional Education Program. A District Officer Role can also count towards your DTM in the new Pathways Education Program.

ELECTED POSITIONS:

The responsibilities and qualifications of each elected leader position are as follows:

1. DISTRICT DIRECTOR

Responsible for directly administering and overseeing the district's day-to-day operations, finances, and human resources.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the District Director shall have served at least six consecutive months as a Club President and at least 12 consecutive months as a Program Quality Director, Club Growth Director or Division Director or a combination thereof.

2. PROGRAM QUALITY DIRECTOR

Responsible for all aspects of education and training within the district.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the Program Quality Director shall have served at least six consecutive months as a Club President and at least 12 consecutive months as a Program Quality Director, Club Growth Director or Division Director or an Area Director.

3. CLUB GROWTH DIRECTOR

Responsible for all aspects of marketing, club-building, and club-retention within the District.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the Club Growth Director shall have served at least six consecutive months as

4. DIVISION DIRECTOR – Eight Divisions – Bass, Central, Eastern, Inner City, Metro, Northern, Ranges, and Southern Division Director

Responsible for coordinating Division activities, working with the Division's Area Directors to achieve the Division's goals, and assisting in the training of area and club leaders.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the Division Director shall have served at least six consecutive months as a member of a district council i.e. must have filled one of the aforementioned roles, been an Area Director, or been a Club President or Vice President of Education.

AREA COUNCIL ELECTED POSITIONS:

The following position is elected at the respective Area Council Meeting (if no successful candidate is identified the position will be filled as appointed by the incoming District Director). Area Council elections must be held up to two (2) weeks before the Annual District Council Meeting (That is, from Saturday 5 May 2019) or up to four weeks afterwards (Up to Saturday 16 June 2019):

1. AREA DIRECTOR

The Area Director serves as the direct liaison between the District and the clubs. Conducts club visits twice a year within their respective area to understand and support club needs. Organises the Area Contests for their area.

Qualifications: Ideally, Area Directors shall have served as a member of a District Council.

APPOINTED POSITIONS:

The following positions shall be appointed by the incoming District Director. You may submit expressions of interest in these positions to enable the incoming District Director to consider you for the role:

1. ADMINISTRATION MANAGER

Responsible for maintaining the historical records of the District, recording and distributing meeting minutes and otherwise maintaining accurate, timely records of District business.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the administration manager should be a reliable, prompt, well-organized Toastmaster who can accurately record meeting actions, has access to a personal computer and is able to reproduce materials.

2. FINANCE MANAGER

Establish and maintain effective fiscal oversight and management of the district. Produce monthly reports reflecting the district's financial status, and ensure that expenditures remain within the budget approved by the district council. Ensure that the district maintains the financial controls established by Toastmasters International.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the finance manager should have accounting experience and be acquainted with the handling of financial matters.

3. PUBLIC RELATIONS MANAGER

Responsible for coordinating publicity efforts in the District. By establishing and maintaining lines of communication between the District and its members, as well as between the District and the public. Working to increase awareness of Toastmasters through all available media.

Qualifications: At the time of taking office, the public relations manager should possess experience in and core understanding of public relations.

THE ROLE OF THE DISTRICT LEADERSHIP COMMITTEE (DLC):

The work of the DLC is critical in ensuring long-term district success. They must (1) seek out prospective candidates; (2) evaluate and interview candidates; (3) nominate candidates; and (4) provide a complete report of candidates. The DLC report must be presented to the district director at least six weeks before the district's Annual Business Meeting. Therefore the DLC looks forward to receiving applications and queries from anyone interested so we can build a strong District Management Team for our members.

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Technology Assists understanding of the District

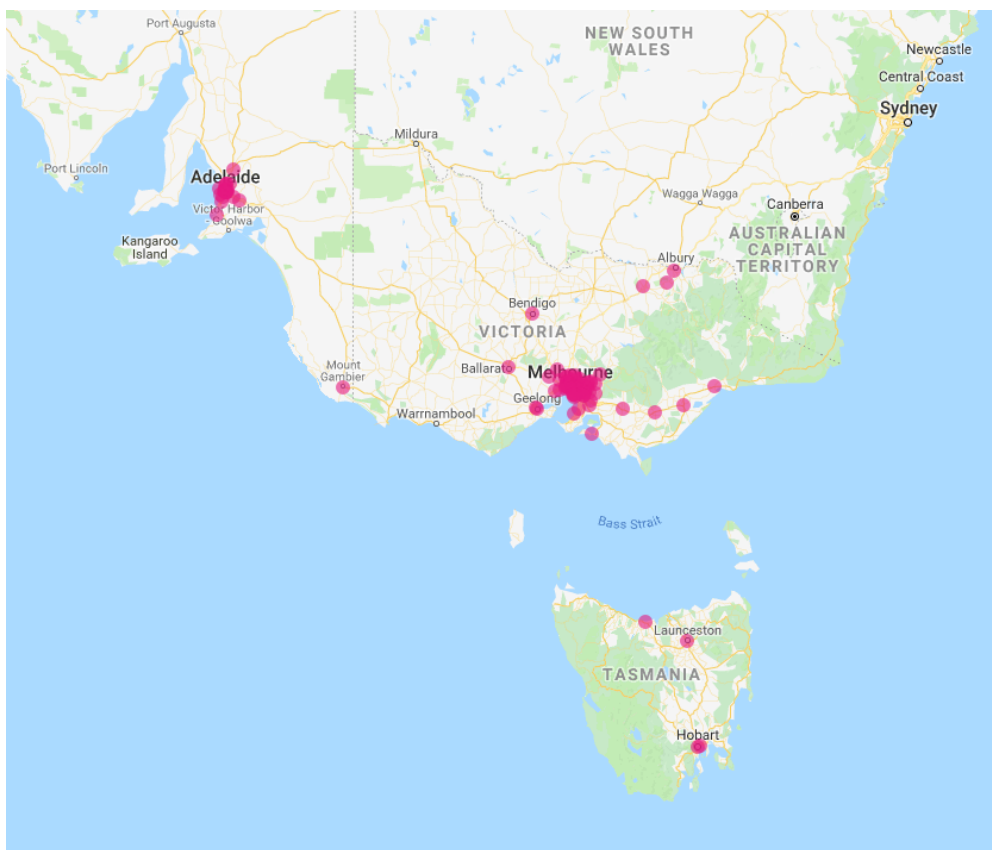
